Information & Guidance:

Construction sites and offices operating during the Coronavirus Covid-19 pandemic need to ensure they are protecting their staff, workforce and others who may visit the site or office in order to minimise the risk of spread of infection.

This guidance is intended to introduce consistent measures on sites and offices of all sizes in line with the Government's recommendations on social distancing.

These are exceptional circumstances and the industry must comply with the latest Government advice on Coronavirus at all times.

The health and safety requirements of any work activity must also not be compromised at this time. If an activity cannot be undertaken safely due to a lack of suitably qualified personnel and adequate competent supervision being available or social distancing being implemented, it must not take place. Where social distancing is difficult to implement, numbers of operatives on site must be reduced to allow for this to be implemented successfully. Whilst this may impact on progress, the health, safety and well being of all on our sites must take precedent.

We are aware that emergency services are also under great pressure and may not be in a position to respond as quickly as usual. Sites must remind the workforce at every opportunity of the Site Operating Procedures which are aimed at protecting them, their colleagues, their families and the UK population.

COVID-19 is a new illness that can affect your lungs and airways. It is caused by a virus called coronavirus.

COVID-19 virus is expelled as droplets from the respiratory tract of an infected individual (e.g. during coughing and sneezing) directly onto a mucosal surface or conjunctiva of a susceptible individual(s) or environmental surface(s). Droplets travel only short distances through the air; a distance of at least 1 metre has been used for deploying droplet precautions. However, the advice from the government and medical experts is a 2-metres social distance which must be followed at all times.

If a site or office is not consistently implementing the measures set out below, prior to aborting any work or closing the site, Site Manager, Contracts Manager, SHEQ Dept., Operations Director and Construction Director must consider appropriate alternative controls. The Board of Directors will have final approval on any decision.

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Symptoms of coronavirus

The most common symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are recent onset of:

- new continuous cough and/or
- high temperature
- loss of taste or smell

For most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild infection

How coronavirus is spread

Because it's a new illness, we do not know exactly how coronavirus spreads from person to person. Similar viruses are spread in cough droplets. It's very unlikely it can be spread through things like packages or food.

Contamination of Surfaces:

Human coronaviruses can survive on inanimate objects and can remain viable for up to 5 days at temperatures of 22-25°C and relative humidity of 40-50% (which is typical of air-conditioned indoor environments). Survival on environmental surfaces is also dependent on the surface type. An experimental study using a SARS-CoV-2 strain reported viability on plastic for up to 72 hours for 48 hours on stainless steel and up to 8 hours on copper.

Decontamination:

A combined detergent/disinfectant solution at a dilution of 1,000 parts per million available chlorine (ppm available chlorine (av.cl.)); or A general-purpose neutral detergent in a solution of warm water followed by a disinfectant solution of 1,000ppm av.cl.

Products must be prepared and used according to the manufacturers' instructions and recommended product "contact times" and PPE/COSHH requirements MUST be followed.

How to avoid catching or spreading germs

There are things you can do to help stop viruses like coronavirus spreading.

DO

- √ wash your hands with soap and water often do this for at least 20 seconds
- ✓ always wash your hands when you get home or into work
- ✓ use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze
- ✓ put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
- ✓ try to avoid close contact with people who are unwell
- DO NOT
- **×** Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth if your hands are not clean

Where the measures in this Risk Assessment cannot be achieved, prior to aborting any work or closing the site, Site Managers must inform their Contracts Manager, SHEQ Dept., Operations Director and Construction Director who will consider appropriate alternative controls. The Board of Directors will have final approval on any decision.

Travel to Site	Contract or spread of Covid-19 on site and within the wider community. Site staff, operatives, visitors and their families.	5	5	25	If someone is displaying symptoms of Coronavirus, they must not under any circumstances, travel to site. When travelling to work or between site locations, workers should travel alone. If workers have no option but to share a vehicle, then they should: • Share with the same individuals and with the minimum number of people at any one time • Wherever possible maintain a distance of two metres and avoid touching their faces • If there is more than one person in a vehicle good ventilation must be maintained (i.e. keeping the windows open) and face covering must be worn at all times • Users of the vehicle must wash their hands for 20 seconds using soap and water or hand sanitiser if soap and water are not available before entering and after getting out of the vehicle • Regularly clean the vehicle using gloves and standard cleaning products, with particular emphasis on handles and other surfaces which may be touched during the journey Site should consider: • Parking arrangements for additional vehicles and bicycles • Other means of transport to avoid public transport e.g. cycling • Providing hand cleaning facilities at entrances and exits. Everyone will be asked to bring pre-prepared meals, hot beverages (in a Thermos flask for example) and drinking water (in refillable drinking bottles) from home. Break times must be staggered to reduce congestion and contact at all times. Hand cleaning facilities or hand sanitiser must be available at the entrance of any room where people eat and must be used by workers when entering, before touching appliances, etc. and leaving the area Everyone will be asked to bring refillable drinking bottles from home for water Workers must sit 2 metres apart from each other whilst eating and avoid all contact – furniture should be repositioned to allow for this to be implemented naturally. Site Manager must immediately inform their Contracts Manager, Construction Director, Operations Director and SHEQ Manager. The operative must follow government guidance on self-isolating whilst awaiting results of testing and advise employer of developing condition. Site staff, operatives, visitors and their families.	5	5	25	 Appointed First-Aiders will be given specific training on how to administer first aid to site personnel including CPR. Specific guidance has been developed and will be available to First Aiders on administering first aid to site personnel. (Coronavirus (COVID-19) – Guidance for First Aiders - Version 1, Revision A - 27.04.20). Appropriate PPE will be distributed to first aiders (subject to availability) to protect them when administering first aid, this will include: – Disposable gloves, – Fluid repellent surgical face mask, – Disposable plastic apron, – Disposable eye protection (such as face visor or goggles). First Aiders must wash hands thoroughly with soap and water or sanitiser before putting on and after taking off PPE. First Aiders must avoid touching their mouth, eyes and/or nose, unless they have recently cleaned their hands after having contact with the individual. If it is necessary to provide assistance to an individual who is symptomatic and may have COVID-19, wherever possible, the casualty should be placed in a location away from others. If there is no physically separate room, others who are not involved in providing assistance must stay at least 2 metres away from the individual. If barriers or screens are available, these may be used. If in an enclosed room, open windows to provide as much fresh air ventilation as possible. If casualties are able, they are to be encouraged to self-help under the guidance of the appointed First Aider who will then be able to maintain physical distancing.
